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### TRUSTEES' REPORT

### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2024 for Aberdeen Bridge of Don St Columba's Church of Scotland (herein referred to St Columba's Church or the Church). The financial statements comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

# Objectives and activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It cooperates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

# Services of Worship

2024 has brought a significant change to St Columba's church as our minister of 33 years, Rev Louis Kinsey, retired in September. The months preceding his retirement were spent considering how we would ensure continuity of his excellent bible teaching and it has been a great joy that a number of elders and other congregation members have stepped forward to lead services and preach. Rev Joe Somevi, a long term friend of the congregation, was appointed as Interim Moderator by the Presbytery of the North East and the Northern Isles and has been supportive in terms of preaching and leading the sacrament of the Lord's supper, as well as taking some funeral services. He is chairing the Kirk Session and guiding us prayerfully through our period of vacancy. Other locums have helped with funeral services and to the year-end worship services were well attended and no discernible change in congregation numbers have been noticed.

The year that has come to an end was marked by a regular attendance at worship services on Sunday mornings, with online options still offered and being used by those not able to attend in person because of infirmity or being away from home. Those who attend in-person worship within the church building are able to enjoy fellowship and have made friendships and relationships which sustain through good times and bad. They have been able to experience the joy of friendship and a sense of happiness within the life of the church is evident.

It is hard to interpret the statistics, but it is apparent that live-streamed worship does meet a very genuine need. The numbers of people connecting with this varies over time but the encouraging number of those that do so is such that we consider this as a mission and ministry opportunity, and it will be reviewed at regular intervals.

In the course of the year, there were regular intergenerational Sunday services, some in café style, which has been welcomed by most of the congregation. These services give an opportunity for all ages to worship meaningfully together and are valued as a way of connecting the varied age groups of the congregation.

# Here are some of the things that we have been able to do in 2024:

# Senior Citizens

During 2024 we were delighted to continue our monthly services in Hamewith Sheltered Housing complex. There are on average around 12 people attending these services. We also offered social events in Hamewith. In Denmore Court, a very sheltered complex in our parish, informal church services restarted after a long break caused by COVID; we hope to extend the social events offered in this setting. The residents of this complex are very frail and the numbers able to attend services are small, but we hope to see an increase as we establish these services. The Friendship Group continues to support our elderly members both socially and pastorally.

# Intergenerational Worship & Ministry

We continued to work to increase the connection between all ages in our church family, recognising the value of learning from one another as we worship, serve and play together. Regular 'All-Together' Services allowed children and adults to worship and learn together. Soup and Singalong events were held at regular points over 2024 encouraging all ages to stay for a free lunch of soup and crusty bread and then join in a singalong of our favourite hymns and choruses. This also served as a way of supporting any who were struggling with the cost of eating or heating their homes.

### The Rise and Shine Club

Over the past 12 months, The Rise and Shine Club, which is held at the same time as morning services, has been exploring a variety of Old Testament and New Testament stories. The Rise and Shine Club now runs in two groups (older and younger). Both groups have been following slightly different programmes, although do still meet regularly as one group for short parts of the session.

In addition to the above, they have been involving themselves more in the life of the congregation. They are on the tea and coffee rota, and the welcome team and are also involved in the worship band for our monthly inter-generational services - all of which the children really enjoy. A few of the young people and a leader supported an event at Hamewith Sheltered Housing just before Christmas.

The children continue to support Agnes, our Compassion child and regularly write and fundraise to support her. The older group are also supporting another Compassion child in addition to Agnes.

# The Under 5s Group

The St Columba's Under 5s Group meets on Wednesday mornings during school termtime from 9.15am-10.45am. Attending this group are mums, dads, grandparents and childminders.

All of the toys are set out ready so that free play can start as soon as children arrive. There is also musical fun-time, with ribbons, followed by snack-time, which is then followed by more free-time to play before everyone helps to tidy up the toys before ending with song-time and a goodbye song.

While the children play, mums have a chance to chat with each other or with one of the team.

# The Friendship Group

This is a good group of over 50 members with a regular attendance of nearly 40. As this group are of an older age group, unpredictable weather can impact attendance.

A varied programme of speakers and entertainment is provided, and although the speakers and entertainment is only offered over winter months, the group continues to meet monthly over summer months for fellowship and to maintain connections. A summer bus outing is a great treat and always well attended.

# Bridge of Don Brigade

A group of almost 100 boys and girls aged 5-17 meet in St Columba's church on Friday evenings in this uniformed organisation. They follow a programme similar to The Boys Brigade, but that differs in the offer to both girls and boys. Dedicated officers lead the youngsters, and the spiritual aspect of their programme is supported by elders from the Kirk Session.

# The Kirk Session and The Unitary Constitution

In the course of 2024, the Kirk Session met 6 times with a small group of elders meeting more frequently to plan worship services and outreach activities. The finance team, property team, children and young people's group and pastoral group met outwith Kirk Session meetings and ensured that all areas of church life progressed. All groups reported to the Kirk Session, and this ensured that the trustees maintained an overview of all aspects of church activities.

# **Property Team**

The aim of the Property Team is to maintain the fabric of the church building and manse. There have been a number of repairs carried out in the church building - some due to storm damage, others general maintenance. This includes roof repairs and replacing boiler internal and external flues. We held a church clear-out to help declutter the church, getting rid of or donating items we no longer use or require. The chairs in the sanctuary are in the process of being cleaned or disposed of, where damaged beyond repair. Insulation has been fitted in the manse loft which should improve the energy efficiency of the manse. In addition to maintenance, as and when required, once the weather improves the plan is to give the woodwork on the outside of the church building a fresh coat of paint, as well as cleaning the outside of the cabin. We are looking into new signage for the church, as the current signs are old and not really visible. An Energy Performance Certificate needs to be completed for the manse.

# **Our Missionary Partners**

There are still Missionaries in Asia and Spain whilst our third in Papua New Guinea retired during the year after many years serving as a teacher whilst translating the Bible for Wycliffe.

The church has continued to receive visits from our missionary partners and regular news reports and has corresponded with them frequently. Both missionary partners are making very positive and measurable contributions towards the betterment of the lives and circumstances of those with whom they are in contact. This has influenced St Columba's Church, serving to challenge our own, local response to the lives and circumstances of those in the community around us.

# **Presbytery Mission Planning**

During the year, the Kirk Session has engaged with elders from other churches in order to advance the mission plan that was approved by the Presbytery of Aberdeen and Shetland. The plan establishes area groupings and the area grouping in which St Columba's Church is involved held inter-church prayer meetings during the course of 2024. Representatives from each of the congregations in the area grouping also met in order to generate proposals for the implementation of the mission plan, and to make suggestions about the shape and deployment of the ministry resources that will be allocated to the area grouping within the plan.

### **Additional Community Involvement**

- 1. Food bank support we encourage Sunday worshippers and others to bring food bank items to church, which we then deliver to Instant Neighbour and Aberdeen Cyrenians. This is an important aspect of our Christian life and service, and it has been good to see how readily the congregation continues to offer this much-needed practical support.
- 2. Social isolation we discontinued the distribution of the weekly newsletter last year. We felt that as we had moved into a post Covid era, there was no longer a need for a weekly newsletter. Instead, we decided to produce a periodic and informational email for the congregation.
- 3. Hot Chocolate club volunteers serve the young people of Bridge of Don Academy free hot chocolate and biscuits on Wednesday lunch times. We share the campus & car park with the academy and the young people spend lunch breaks around our building. We serve over 150 young people most weeks in term times and this outreach has been very successful in making links between church and school.
- 4. Toasted as result of the success of the Hot Chocolate Club an application was made to the Church of Scotland's Seeds for Growth fund to allow further links to be made with the Academy. It was apparent that many young people were not having breakfast before leaving for school, so a weekly breakfast club has been started offering free hot drinks and toast, with equipment being purchased using grant funding from Seeds for Growth. We are excited by the potential opportunities which these activities have led to, with school and community education colleagues now reaching out to us to explore further links.
- 5. Cloverhill This is a new social housing scheme of 536 homes built on the edge of our parish boundaries, across a busy trunk road with no community spaces yet provided. The children who live here attend schools in our parish and we have started to try to make links and offer Christian friendship to the residents of this area. Some mission week activities were held in the area, and Christmas activities were also provided & more outreach will be taking place over the next months.

# Conclusion

The retiral of our long serving minister has led to some significant changes in the life of the congregation in the past year. We had to come to terms with his retiral and accept that things would change. After his retiral we became a church waiting to see where God would guide us and waiting for the Presbytery of the North East and Northern Isles to advise us whether we can call a new minister, but we are trying to wait well, and still moving ahead in exciting new ways. We continue to worship the Lord and to try to serve our community. Many positive steps took place over the year, as the report shows, as well as a chapter closing in the life of the congregation. The Trustees look forward to a coming year that builds on the blessings of the past one, for the good of others and for the glory of God.

### Structure, governance and management

During the previous year the congregation moved from the Model Deed Constitution to the Unitary Constitution.

The congregation is a registered charity, number SC027440 and is administered in accordance with the terms of the Unitary Constitution and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. Now that the Unitary Constitution has been adopted, a number of ministry teams are being formed in order to discern those with particular gifts and to involve them more greatly and directly in the life and work of the congregation.

# Financial review

The year ended 31 December 2024 resulted in a net receipt position of £14,568 (2023 - £6,959 net payments).

Total receipts increased by 19% to £112,817 (2023 - £94,541) largely due to the level of donations received income in 2024. The primary source of income for the Church continues to be donations from members of the congregation, which, including tax recovered on Gift Aid, accounted for approximately 86% (£97,128) of total income.

Total resources expended, as detailed in Note 5, amount to £98,249 (2023 - £101,500). The contribution to the Church of Scotland's national organisation is the single largest element of annual expenditure.

# Reserves policy

Restricted funds are held for the purposes set out in note 2. Unrestricted funds of £147,920 (2023 - £139,988) are held at the balance sheet date. It is the Trustees' policy to hold sufficient reserves to meet ongoing requirements, fabric maintenance and the activities of the congregation. At 31 December 2024 the general fund holds sufficient reserves to meet greater than 12 months expenditure which the Trustees consider to be more than sufficient to meet the policy.

### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024 which are set out on pages 9 to 16.

### Respective responsibilities of Trustees and independent examiner

# 1. Trustee remuneration and related party transactions

During the year under review, the following transactions with Trustees took place:

Expenses of £2,820 (2023 - £2,089) were reimbursed to six Trustees (2023 - three Trustees) during the year.

In addition, the Church paid council tax of £2,704 (2023 - £3,131) relating to the Manse on behalf of the Minister. No other Trustees received reimbursement of expenses incurred as a result of carrying out their duties.

No payments were made to Trustees for work undertaken or services provided and no Trustee or a person related to a Trustee had any personal interest in any contract or transaction entered into by the Church during the year.

During the year a total of £20,250, excluding Gift Aid, was donated to the Church by Trustees.

# Restricted funds

Youth worker: Exists to pay the salary, expenses and occasional training costs of the congregation's Youth Ministry Leader.

Youth ministry fund: These funds, which arose from a residual surplus on previous youth residential weekends, are available to the Youth Ministry Leader for running youth activities.

Lisa Smith fund: Making grants to younger people, enabling them to travel abroad on short-term mission experiences.

Flower fund: For floral decoration of the Church, on Sundays and all other special occasions.

Mission partners fund: This fund represents funds from a Gift Day in 2008 to be used for financial support for the Church's missionary contacts. This fund ceased during 2024.

10 must know bible stories fund: This arises from grants and donations for the 10 Must Know Bible Stories project, to cover salary costs for the Schools' Worker and all expenses associated with this work. This fund was closed in 2023 with the outstanding funds transferred to other projects, as agreed by the Kirk Session after sanction from the Church of Scotland Go For It Fund team.

Third party collections fund: This fund relates to retiral offerings and fundraising income generated for third party charities and organisations. The carrying balance represents cash due to be paid out to the nominated beneficiaries.

# 2. Movements in funds (continued)

Senior citizen's fund: To pay the expenses in connection with bus trips and outings for older people, both members and non-members of the Church. This fund ceased during 2024.

Flourish project: Providing a Christian based course to young people focussing on developing a healthy self-esteem and their mental and emotional wellbeing. There was no activity on this fund during the year and with no replacement for the Youth Minister imminent, the decision was taken to close this fund.

Household hardship project: This represents monies received from the Corra Foundation to support people facing disadvantage. The funds can be passed on, either in cash or vouchers, to those experiencing poverty. This fund ceased during 2023.

# **Designated funds**

Sunday school: Financing the Sunday School and its work.

Summer holiday club: Financing the annual children's summer camp held at the Church.

Under fives group: Financing a drop-in group for under fives and their carers that meet in the church.

Friendship group: Financing the activities of the Church's friendship group.

Benevolent fund: This minister of the Church makes discretionary grants from this fund to help those poorer in the parish who are experiencing financially difficult times.

Childrens' ministry fund: Fund for outreach activities for children in the local community; working with and in schools, and running holiday activities to spread the good news of Jesus to the children.

# 3. Analysis of donations and grants
